## The Boston Tea Party



- 1 The early days of this country were full of drama. Emotions ran high. The Colonists wanted to be free of England. They wanted to start their own country because they did not like the way the English were treating them. They wanted to live how they liked. They were willing to fight for their freedom. That's exactly what they had to do.
- 2 The Boston Tea Party took place in 1773. It happened before the Revolutionary War actually began. It was called a party, but it really wasn't. The colonists in Boston, Massachusetts, were angry. The English had put a tax on tea and many other things the colonists used.
- 3 In mid-December, English ships arrived in Boston Harbor. There were three ships, which were named the *Dartmouth*, the *Beaver*, and the *Eleanor*. They were carrying a lot of tea that belonged to an English company. That company did not have to pay the same tax that the Colonists did. The colonists decided to protest. They wanted to strike out against the English.
- 4 On December 16, late at night, about 50 colonists came aboard the ships. They were dressed as Mohawk Indians. Everyone knew they were not Indians, though. They called themselves the Sons of Liberty. Samuel Adams led them. Adams was a patriot. That means he wanted the colonies to be free of English rule.
- 5 The Sons of Liberty destroyed the tea. There were 342 chests in all. First, they used axes to split open the chests. Then they threw the tea into the harbor. On the shore, a crowd of onlookers cheered. They had successfully protested against the English tax. Later, the colonists made sure the chests of tea were sunk. They did not want any of it landing onshore.



- 6 The English had every right to be furious. They saw what happened as destruction of private property, not a protest. Then other American cities joined in the protest. They wanted England to see that they didn't like the tax, either. They threw the English tea into the ocean, too. The English became even angrier, and they wanted to punish everyone. They especially wanted to punish the people of Boston. In 1774, they closed the port in Boston. They also ended the self-government of the colony of Massachusetts.
- 7 The Colonists called these and other new laws the "Intolerable Acts." The laws only increased their desire to be free from England. Finally, in 1775, the American Revolution began. Tea became a symbol of American freedom.
